Issues & Vision Workshop Draft Report of Consultation

August 2007

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Summary

This Consultation Report outlines the views expressed at a stakeholder 'Issues and Vision' workshop, which was held to build consensus on where we were (issues) and where we wanted to be (vision). The workshop was held on Friday 27th July 2007, at the VITCC, in Tredegar and involved 27 attendees representing the LDP Steering Group Sub-group members and LDP Forum members (see Appendix A).

Issues Workshops

The first workshop task involved attendees discussing different topic areas, to agree and then priorities issues. The two most significant issues for each of the topic areas is as follows:

Housing

- Create a more balanced population stemming out migration
- Provide a range of housing opportunities to meet aspirations including the need for affordable housing.

Town Centres

- To find a role/ function for town centres
- Encourage multiple retailers and a mix of uses within the town centres specialist shops, coffee shops and offices creating a niche market.

Recreation, Leisure and Tourism

- To foster sustainable tourism and leisure in order to boost the local economy
- To foster sustainable tourism, re-engaging local communities with the national and built historic environment

Transport

• To improve access to services facilities and employment, particularly by public transport, walking and cycling

Joint second were

• To provide a transport system that encourages healthy and active lifestyles, is safer and supports local communities

• To improve the transport system to assist in the regeneration of the area *Employment*

- The implications of the decline in the manufacturing sector and the shift in favour of the service sector and technological industries
- Changing dependence on particular industries and diversifying the economy

Environment

- To protect and enhance local landscape in the face of competing development uses
- Maximise the natural environment for health and well being

This was followed by a further task where attendees were required to prioritise the most significant issues for Blaenau Gwent. The two most significant issues were:

• The implications of the decline in the manufacturing sector and the shift in favour of the service sector and technological industries; and

• The need to find a role/ function for town centres.

With the following two housing issues were close behind:

- The need to create a more balanced population stemming out migration; and
- The need to provide a range of housing opportunities to meet aspirations including the need for affordable housing.

Vision Workshops

The 'Vision' workshop involved building consensus on where Blaenau Gwent wanted to be by 2021. This involved attendees discussing whether or not the Community Plan Vision was appropriate for the LDP. As each of the groups agreed that the Community Plan Vision required further work, each group attempted to write a Vision for the area.

Way Forward

The Council will seek to ensure that the issues identified are addressed in the preparation of the Local Development Plan. The discussions held around the Vision will be used to prepare the Vision for the Local Development Plan.

Participants gave feedback on the workshop and 95% found the experience useful to very useful.

1. Introduction

- 1.1. In November 2006 Blaenau Gwent County Borough Council made the decision to discontinue work on their Unitary Development Plan and start work on a Local Development Plan. The timetable for the various statutory stages of production of the Local Development Plan is set out in the Delivery Agreement (May 2007).
- 1.2. The first step in the process of preparing the Plan was to draft and formally consult on the 'Issues Paper' and alongside this an 'Issues and Visioning Workshop' was held. The workshop took place on the 27th July 2007 with LDP Steering Group Sub-Group members and the LDP Forum members. A full list of attendees is provided at appendix A, a copy of the agenda at appendix B and a copy of the introductory presentation at appendix C.
- 1.3. The purpose of this report is to record and analyse the information gathered and to provide the Council with a clear indication of the views and wishes of those attending the workshop.

2. Issues Workshops

The aim of workshops 1 and 2 was to work collaboratively to identify the main issues that needed to be addressed by the Local Development Plan.

- 2.1. In all, six different topic areas were discussed, three in the first set of workshops and a further three in the second set of workshops. The first workshops looked at Housing, Town Centres and Recreation, Leisure and Tourism. The second workshops looked at Transport, Environment and Employment.
- 2.2. All those attending were allocated to one topic in each of the 2 workshops. In allocating people to groups the intention was to secure a cross section of interest groups whilst ensuring experts were allocated to their particular field. The following tables indicate who was involved in each workshop.

2.3. The facilitator set the context for the workshop by summarising the National and County Borough Picture for the particular topic area, as set out in the Issues Paper (distributed to the invitees beforehand). The facilitator then set the following tasks:

Task 1 – The group was asked to delete/amend/add to the Issues identified in order to build consensus on the issues in that topic area.

Task 2 – The group were then asked to prioritise the issues to identify the most significant issues. Each person was provided with 2 stickers to identify what they see as the most significant issues.

For detailed results of this task see Appendix D.

Task 3

The aim of task 3 was to identify the most significant issues for Blaenau Gwent.

2.4. Following workshop 1 and 2 the Issues identified for each topic area were placed around the room for everyone to view to enable the group to identify further issues and to vote for which were the two most significant issues overall. The following table indicates how many votes each issue received.

From this it can be deduced that the two most significant issues were:

- The implications of the decline in the manufacturing sector and the shift in favour of the service sector and technological industries; and
- To find a role/ function for town centres.

With the following two housing issues close behind:

- Create a more balanced population stemming out migration; and
- Provide a range of housing opportunities to meet aspirations including the need for affordable housing.

3. Vision Workshop

- 3.1. A short presentation (see Appendix C) was given on the aim of the workshop which was to create a vision for Blaenau Gwent.
- 3.2. The facilitators identified visions that should be taken into account in preparing the vision for Blaenau Gwent (the Community Plan and other local and regional visions) and then set the following tasks:

Task 1 – Is the Community Plan Vision sufficient? Does it meet the requirements for a Local Development Plan Vision?

3.3. This was discussed and all three groups reached agreement that although the statement was succinct, it was not distinctive to Blaenau Gwent. It therefore failed to meet the criteria for a LDP Vision Statement i.e. that it should be a succinct statement of intent; a point of reference for all parts of the plan and all participants; distinct to the area.

Task 2 – Required that if the Community Plan Vision was not considered appropriate, the group would need to create a vision for the Local Development Plan.

3.4. As all three groups considered that the vision of the Community Plan was not appropriate for the purpose of this exercise, the attendees drafted new visions under the guidance of the facilitators.

Group 1 used the issues identified for the County Borough as a basis for the vision and produced the following:

By 2020 Blaenau Gwent will offer a valleys experience that will benefit local people, visitors and those who work in Blaenau Gwent by providing:

- quality housing
- a sustainable, diverse economy
- towns that have specific roles
- lifelong learning opportunities
- a vibrant visitor destination

Group 2 used the related visions as the basis for the new vision by identifying key words and incorporating them to create a vision relevant to Blaenau Gwent.

By 2021 Blaenau Gwent will be a network of sustainable, vibrant valley communities, providing a high quality of life.

Group 3 used the visions provided as the basis for the new vision for Blaenau Gwent by choosing key words and incorporating them to create the following visions.

Blaenau Gwent, vibrant valley communities, where people feel proud, happy, valued and included.

Blaenau Gwent, rich past, dynamic future.

Blaenau Gwent, communities for the future.

4. What Next?

4.1. The workshop was useful for discussing and prioritising the issues and assisted in setting a vision for the Local Development Plan. These findings will be taken into account when the Council prepares draft Strategy Options for discussion at workshops in November 2007 and when it drafts the 'Preferred Strategy' for consultation in September 2008.
